## Kittur Rani Channamma Education Society's A Brief Profile

Towards the end of nineteen hundred sixties, a group of elites in Bailhongal and Bailhongal Taluka thought of ways they could participate in a noble task of extending higher educational facilities to the people of this region which was educationally and socially backward. This group decided to form an educational society and formed one such in 1968 and named it after Rani Channamma as Kittur Rani Channamma Education Society, Bailhongal. Shri S.R.Kanti Hon'ble Minister for Law and Parliamentary Affairs, the then Mysore Govt. was the Founder President, under whose able guidance, the society started functioning. The great seers – His Holiness Sri.Sri. Duradundeshwar Mahant Swamiji of Murgod and His Holiness Sri. Sri. Shivabasava Maha Swamiji of Naganur extended their benevolent blessings for the steady growth of the society.

People at large enthusiastically came forward with helping hand to develop this society. Shrimanth B.B.Inamadar along with Shrimanth Devendrappa Linganagouda Inamadar and his sons of Khodanpur jointly donated acres of prime land to K.R.C.E.Society. Public institutions of this area also extended their co-operation and full support to the society in carrying out its noble mission. Town Municipality of Bailhongal leased part of its high school building to run the college; Agriculture Produce Market Committee and Taluka Development Board have generously contributed to the cause of society. An immense public contribution in the form of donations is worth remembering.

As a first endeavour, K.R.C.E.Society established Arts and Science College at Bailhongal in the year 1968. For fulfilling the rigorous task generous donations were collected from the public. Mention must be made of generous donations given by Sri G.V.Deshnur, an industrialist, Sri S.V.Sadhunavar, landlord of Amatur and Shri Sankanagoudaru S.Patil of Devalapur. Hence, the college is renamed as G.G.Deshnur Arts, B.M. Patil Commerce as S.V.Sadhunavar Science College, Bailhogal. After the establishment of Arts and Science College, the Society took great paints to recruit well-qualified staff and to make available all possible facilities to the students. Within a few years G.G.Deshnur Arts, B.M. Patil Commerce and S.V.Sadhunavar Science College gained enormous goodwill as provider of quality education and the enrolment of students increased considerably.

In the year 1980 college was shifted to the new campus by the side of Bailhongal- Belgaum road within as easy reach of Bailhongal Town precincts. The Government at nominal rate contributed part of this land. Sri.Veerendra Patil, Hon'ble Chief Minister the then Mysore Govt., laid the foundation stone for the construction of college building. The Arts, Commerce and Science College is the premier institution that imparted quality education to the aspirants. Many new course were introduced for the benefit of students of this region. Expansion activities gained momentum during 1980's and under able and exemplary leadership of Shri S.H.Koujalagi Ex-MP and The Chairman of the Society. Dr. Vishwanath Patil assumed of the chairman in the year 2007. Under his leadership various institutions are functioning to impart different event branches of knowledge.

## **CRITERION – I** Curricular Aspects

The college has a clear vision, mission, goals and objectives. The institution imparts instructions at undergraduate courses in accordance with semester where as PG in Commerce has a choice based credit system. Curricular, Co-curricular and extra-curricular activities help students to improve personality development, communication skills, leadership qualities and team spirit. Students are sensitized to human gender, cultural and environmental values, NSS / NCC / Red Cross / Scouts & Guides infuse the spirit of inquiry, sacrifice and community services. The faculty is well experienced, many of whom are on the Board of Studies and Board of Examiners. Some of them were involved in designing curriculum of the affiliated university and other autonomous colleges. The placement cell organizes various workshops / trainings / orientation programme / skill development activities to increase employability of the students. The institution collects feed-back from various stakeholders and analysis for further improvement and implementation.

## **CRITERION – II Teaching – Learning & Evaluation**

The college gives publicity through 06 types of advertisements. The college takes admission based on Government rules and gives equal opportunity to all the sections(SC/ST, OBC, Women, Minority, Differently abled).

The institute offers 03 UG courses, 01 Certificate course and 01 PG (M.Com, self financed) course. Students have gone through bridge course, induction test and orientation progarmmes during the course period.

Various committees such as NSS, NCC, Red Cross, Women Cell, Cultural Association function in the college throughout the year to sensitizing the issues like gender, environment and health. Institution has promoted the use of ICT based teaching learning process through internet, INFLIBNET and providing NME scheme.

IQAC prepares calendar of events and chalk out detailed plans to enhance quality, individual departments function in accordance with calendar of events. Students are encouraged to interact with teachers, resource persons and other expertise and they are motivated to participate in various competitions.

Institution encourages faculty to participate in various conferences, seminars, workshops and present the papers effectively.

College library supports the teaching and learning process by providing the facilities such as books, journals, magazines, e-journals, OPAC, INFLIBNET. The

Placement Cell train the students and provides information about employability of students.

Institution follows University rules and regulations to conduct exams. The institute evaluates teaching-learning process by collecting feedback from students.

The college has student centric practices such as orientation, projects, industrial and study tours, offering with endowment cash prizes.

Teaching, learning and evaluation activities are conducted effectively.

## **CRITERION – III Research, Consultancy & Extension**

Research is the back bone of higher education. Teaching and research are the two faces of the same coin. To develop the quest of inquiry and promote research culture among the faculty and students the institution has initiated various measures. The college has extended maximum support to promote research by forming research

The college has extended maximum support to promote research by forming research committee. The committee comprised of senior teachers and made valuable suggestions to promote research culture among the faculty and students.

The institution encourages and support faculty and students writing and publication of research articles. 44 articles of faculty members have been published in national / international / peer reviewed journals.

Our students are also actively involved in undertaking research projects.

The college has received grant from VGST for up gradation of laboratory. Four faculty members have received grant from UGC and other agencies for minor research projects and completed 03 projects, 02 projects are under progress. 05 faculty members have registered for Ph.D and work is under progress.

The institution is proud of Dr. Y.G. Baligatti, and Dr. S.M. Lokapur, for their rich and long experience in research. They are the recognized research guides of Rani Channamma University, Belagavi and guiding 07 research scholars each.

Department of Science is conducting Science Exhibition and outreach activities for high school students that promotes the spirit of inquiry among the students.

NCC / NSS volunteers conduct extension activities which have benefited the community. 03 NCC cadets have had the honour to participate in Republic Day parade held at New Delhi.

Dr. Y.G. Baligatti, Dept. of Commerce offer free consultancy service in taxation.

Prof. S.M. Hiremath was awarded as 'Best Programme Officer' of NSS by Rani Channamma Univrsity, Belagavi. Dr. S.M. Lokapur, Dept. of Kannada was awarded 'Gold Medal' for his outstanding contribution to literary activities.

Our college has MOUs and collaborations with different organizations. It provides an opportunity to access the practical knowledge from industry, to render community service and to share research knowledge to our students.

## **CRITERION – IV Infrastructure & Learning Resources**

The college has good infrastructure facilities for teaching, learning and evaluation process. It is set on 15 acres of land which is free from pollution. There are 16 lecture halls, 02 seminar halls, 06 well equipped laboratories, one botanical garden including shade garden, one animal museum. Along with a play ground there is a multi gym facility and yoga hall.

NCC, NSS, Scouts & Guides, Red Cross units, Cultural Association and Women's Empowerment Cell help to inculcate values like discipline, service and sacrifice which are reinforced by the activities of cultural and women's empowerment cell.

Health center is available on the campus to take health care of students & staff. Ladies Hostel is constructed under XI Plan period of UGC. Physics Department has been funded by VGST in 2013-14. There is one Boys hostel and one Ladies hostel together can accommodate 54 students with necessary facilities.

Placement cell works to enhance student employment opportunities by facilitating on campus & online selection events.

SWO & Grievance Redressal cell help in other kinds of problems faced by students if, any. Canteen and Bank facilities are available on the campus premises. Security in the campus is enabled with guards and CCTV.

The Library having an area of 3362 sq. ft. with complete automation and has INFLIBNET, internet browsing & reprography facilities. Library has Advisory committee with Principal as a President, looks and monitors the library activities.

There is a periodic up gradation of IT infrastructure & associated facilities every year to meet the needs of the students.

Computers with internet facility have been provided to all the departments including staff room. Wi-Fi facility is available on the campus. Sufficient provision is made for purchase of books, up gradation, maintenance of the computers and other accessories. Care has been taken to maintain all sensitive equipments.

Management is extending its full support in providing and maintenance of the needed infrastructure of the institution.

## **CRITERION – V** Students Support & Progression

With the help of updated prospectus students are made familiar with vision and mission of the college, admission procedures, course details, scholarships and college amenities. Students from SC/ST, OBC, Minority and Weaker Section are supported with State/National/institutional scholarships. Orientation programs and remedial classes are conducted for slow learners. Students are encouraged to participate in co-curricular, extra curricular activities and sports activities. Placement Officer organizes programs on life skill, spoken English and personality development to promote entrepreneurial skills among students. Exposures to students are given through study tours, industrial visits, awareness programs and science exhibitions. College has Grievances redressal cell and anti-ragging committee. So far no issues of sexual harassment have been reported. Alumni Association contributes to the development of the institution.

The most of the students prefer to go for B.Ed. B.Com graduates of our college are helped in admission to M.Com course offered by the institution. Personal attention is given to the students who are at risk of failure and dropout.

Gymkhana Department, NCC, NSS, Cultural Department, Scouts & Guides, Red Cross, SC/ST Cell, Women Empowerment Cell and Student Welfare Cell play pivotal role in the overall developments of the students. Our NCC students have participated in Republic Day parade in New Delhi and Rajpath. Many of our students have become University blue. The institution uses social sites to network and collaborate with alumni and former faculty for the development of our college.

## **CRITERION – VI Governance, Leadership & Management**

To achieve vision, and mission of the college, the top management including board of management of our society, subcommittee chairman of our college and principal provide effective leadership.

After interacting with all stakeholders, strategies for effective implementation of the college plans and policies are formulated. Teachers, administrative staff and HODs, Conveners of committees and associations are keen in promoting leadership among the students.

Academic needs are fulfilled by encouraging leadership. College organizes leadership camps for the improvement of quality policies. To ensure community involvement the college organizes various programmes. The management encourages staff and student to attend seminar, workshops, conferences to enhance their knowledge. The faculty members are motivated to take up research activities, project works and conduct extension activities and community services.

In the beginning of the year principal in consultation with the management prepares a detailed budget and plans the financial management. sufficient care is taken for the globalization of resources for developmental academic and administrative activities. The main sources of income are grants from state government, UGC funding, VGST and student fees.

The perspective plan is prepared every year by IQAC for academic activities and additional infrastructure development. Periodically feed-back is taken from the students and parents. Finding of the feed-back are analyzed and if necessary action is taken and quality policy is formulated by the principal and top management. The institution is having the future plans of installation of solar lighting, up gradation of zoogly museum, introduction of new PG courses etc.



### **Best Practice 1**

1. Title: "Science Exhibition" : To develop scientific temperament.

### 2. Goal:

- To motivate primary and secondary school students to choose Science as their major subject.
- To develop Scientific approach in the development of scientific world.
- To cultivate research approach amongst under-graduate students.
- To provide scientific research platform in emerging child-bud.
- To enrich Scientific finding for development of Scientific India.
- To Motivate students creative ideas about science.

### 3. Context;

To develop scientific temper and creation of scientific attitude among students is an important task to develop educated society.

Students and teachers should develop scientific approach for the creation of eco friendly environment for learning science through various science exhibitions, various seminars, different experimental workshops etc. So, these activities motivate students to think or to develop positive impact for the development of scientific society and to think recent development and environmental problems which are created by the human being and their impact.

Teachers make sure that they have to provide scientific problems to the students and make them to analyse their results on the basis of their environmental issues.

### 4. The Practice:

The practice of Science Exhibition was organised for primary, High School & 10+2 students. It was organised by all science departments with active participation of all science students in the following subjects.

- a. Physics
- b. Chemistry
- c. Botany
- d. Zoology
- e. Computer Science

The exhibition depicts the different innovative ideas in different subjects which are mentioned below.

### Physics:-

Physics exhibition aims at follows,

- To develop mechanical techniques in students
- To manifest various concept of globalization and green house effect concept
- To develop recycle energy sources
- To create awareness about energy sources

The students of physics department put the rangoli powder in the water and explained why rangoli particles are not spreading in water. Followed by this, they highlighted all the phenomena exhibited by light waves in a beautiful manner. They show the rainbow colours occurring in the sky in their dark room laboratory experiment.

Another event is, to make the students familiar to the electronic components; they exhibited all the electronic equipments starting with simplest resistor to IC chips. Conversion of AC to DC is demonstrated by the reclifier experiment, which was very beneficial to the secondary school students, so that they can distinguish between AC and DC.

One more experiment is, the students brought all the stars down to their department only. With audio-video Visual aids, they compared the sizes of stars and the evolution of the stars etc. All the students enjoyed each one of experiments, both from the physics point as well as a part of the entertainment also.

### Chemistry:-

Chemistry exhibition aims at follows,

- To initiate creative and scientific temper in students about various chemical reactions
- To develop various Physico-chemical analytical techniques in students
- To develop Eco-friendly chemical management
- To Develop social awareness and pollution control concepts and ideas in students.
- To make pollution free environment.

Verious laboratory glassware's and equipments were exhibited. All the teachers have given guidance and study materials to our students to participate in the exhibition. The performance of the students in the said exhibition is appreciated by the stake holders.

### **7.3. 1. Title of Practice: Blood Donation Camp:** Involvement of students and Staff in extension activities.

### 2. Goal:

- To create awareness of health hygiene
- To inform the importance of blood donation
- Social responsibility
- To encourage people to donate blood.
- Donate for low income families.
- To save lives.

### 3. The Context;

The problem of scarcity of blood in emergency situations to save the life has made the institution to conduct blood donation camps every year. Besides, the commercial aspects of the blood in the market can be effectively contained through such camps.

### Impact of blood donation

- 1. One donation of blood can save as many as 3 lives.
  - i. <u>Platelets</u>: are made in bone marrow and help to clot blood. It can help in blood clot and can be needed by many different patients including people:
  - Having heart surgery,
  - Experiencing uncontrolled bleeding,

- Going through chemotherapy
- ii. <u>Plasma</u>: It is fluid portion of blood. It contains proteins and salt and it helps to carry not only blood cells; but also anzymes, hormones nutrients. It also affects the blood pressure. Plasma carried nutrients and blood cells throughout the body. Plasma can be needed by many different patients including burn victims, those with liver disease or hemophilia.
- iii.<u>Red Cells</u>: are made of bone marrow. They contain a protein called hemoglobin, that attaches oxygen and allows it to be transported to all body tissues. It gives red color to blood. It can be needed by many different patients including:
  - Patients with sickle cell disease
  - Premature babies
  - Patients experiencing post surgical complications.
- 2. Reduces risk of cancer and hemochromatosis(it is excess absorption of iron).
- 3. It helps in reducing risk of damage to liver and pancreas.
- 4. It may helps in improving heart diseases and reducing obesity.
- 5. Helps in production of new blood cells after donation of blood and helps in maintaining good health.

### 4. The Practice:

Blood donation camp is organised by our college NCC, NSS, Red Cross, Scouts and Guides, Woman empowerment cell units in collaboration with NGO, Government Hospitals.

**5. Evidence of success:** The number of blood donors are increasing year by year. Many students and staff have participated in blood donation camp voluntarily. Every year in our College about 60 to 70 units of blood is collected from the students and staff and the same is donated to Government blood bank. Each unit of blood saves 3 lives. So, the total 210 persons are saved every year. Most of our college students are having O+ive blood group and few students are identified rare blood group. The rare blood group students name, M. No and address are informed to Doctors. The list of students who have donated the blood is maintained which is as under


## POST ACCREDITATION REPORT


